Dear Parent/Carers,

We at Haytor View Community Primary School are part of a national project called 'Partnership for Inclusion of Neurodiversity' (PINS). The project is about meeting the needs of neurodiverse children in schools.

What does neurodiverse mean?

Being neurodiverse means that people's brains work in different ways. Everyone's brain is different which makes the world an interesting and wonderful place. Neurodiversity includes people with conditions like autism, ADHD, dyslexia and more.

How will the PINS project work?

This a national project with health and education specialists and parent carers (through the Parent Carer Forum) in primary schools.

The project will:

- support schools to be more inclusive of every child (and family), including those who are neurodiverse
- help shape the whole school's special educational needs provision
- provide early interventions at a school level
- · upskill school staff
- support and strengthen partnerships between schools and parent carers
