### Moving On . . .

Transition is the experience children have when they move to a new setting, this might be a new school or a new class. Transition is an important learning experience as change is ongoing throughout our lives and something that it's important to be able to manage successfully. As such we recognise the importance of careful planning for children's transition experiences.

We have been tremendously respectful of the support you have provided to the school since the children's first return following closure in September 2020, as well as the next return in March 2021. You have supported our approach which has been firmly focused on making these returns safe and happy ones, seeing children coming back to a familiar environment during unfamiliar times. As we have mentioned before, our key aims have been that children feel that:

- they are our main focus
- they are welcome, safe and can trust us
- their relationships with others, children and adults, are important
- while everything is not quite normal we will manage things for them and keep them safe.

We know the last 16 months have been unprecedented and have brought huge challenge, we have been tremendously respectful of the feedback we have received from children and parents, and know that with your support we 'got it right' for the children. Now we need to carefully navigate another change - your child's successful transition into their new class after the summer break.

We know the experiences children have at key transition points can offer an opportunity for each child to develop positive learning dispositions linked to 'change', which will enable children to develop their emotional and social well-being, as well as their sense of identity. Children who develop positive attributes such as strength, resilience, independence and self-confidence will be able to call on these attributes to support transitions throughout their lives.

Transition at Haytor View is viewed as building strong and trusting relationships between children, adults and parents/carers, through effective communication and supporting the consistent transfer of existing relationships and relevant information

We aim to support transition through a range of opportunities both across the year and as the children get closer to 'moving on'. This year, whilst these opportunities are somewhat restricted, we have been keen to provide as 'normal' and 'full' an experience as possible. This has been supported by:

- Spending time in different spaces around the school as they have moved about the school in their day to day routines;
- Meeting a range of school adults in day to day opportunities such as lunchtime;
- Spending time with their new teacher in story sessions, Time to Think;
- Having regular discussions throughout the year focused on children's well being, learning and development;
- Teachers sharing with their new teacher, each child's unique motivations, strengths, attitudes, skills, knowledge, understanding and learning dispositions, as children move classes;
- Careful consideration about the support each child requires in new situations;
- Individual pupil planning for children with SEND;

In the transition process we ensure children have a voice, providing them with the opportunity to ask questions, seek explanations and express their views. Additional to the above we will be having lots of

transition discussions. These will include teachers talking to each other and planning together. It will also see teachers providing opportunities for parents to catch up by phone, and where appropriate we can have have a safely managed face to face appointment. The non pupil day on 8<sup>th</sup> July will provide an opportunity for you to catch up with your child's current class teacher and discuss any questions you have regarding transition.

Following the Summer break your child's classroom will be ready to greet them on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> September, this will see all children:

- being individually welcomed into the classroom by name;
- having a named peg for coats
- having a named tray for belongings
- having all books named and ready to use
- learning in an environment where learning resources are organised and ready to access

We know that moving class is difficult, especially during these times where parent access to the site is restricted. It is our aim to ensure that your child has a smooth transition which will enable your child to continue their learning and development in a supported, comfortable and uninterrupted way.

We will continue to update you via the weekly newsletters. However, should you have any queries regarding transition please feel free to discuss them with your child's current or future teacher or phase leader.

### Arrangements for Year 2021 - 22

You will see a number of changes to our organisation this year, as we grow our provision and as members of staff make decisions regarding their next steps.

Mrs Sanders will be leaving the Foundation Stage team this year in her role as Foundation Stage Practitioner to spend time with her young boy, we are currently looking to appoint a new person into our Foundation Stage team.

After 10 years of working at Haytor View Denise Tancock has decided that she is retiring from her role as Parent Support Worker, school leaders and Governors have worked on plans moving forward. This includes a number of school staff: Mr Hampton, Mrs Galling, Mrs Cousins and Miss Shopland being trained in Early Help to provide this support across the school. Mr Hampton and Mrs Galling will continue as the school's safeguarding leads.

Mrs Boulton has hung up her tabbard, following 33 years of volunteering and being a lunch time partner. She will be missed from the lunch provision. As you will expect Mr Franklin and his team have developed a plan, and will be supporting the lunch time provision from the Key Stage 1 team next year, which will really support the Key Stage 1 children.

Miss Cameron will be working as Progression Partner in Key Stage 1 working with Mr Franklin and Miss Hall to support children's well being and learning progress, as well as provide cover for Mr Franklin's planning and leadership time, and Miss Hall's planning time.

Mrs Brown has been appointed as Year 3 teacher for September, following a successful 8 months with us supporting the current Year 3 we are delighted that Mrs Brown can stay with the Key Stage 2 team next year.

Following a difficult year, Mr Whitty has decided to step down from his role as Key Stage 2 teacher at Haytor View, in order to support his continued recovery from COVID. All of us will appreciate the considerable challenges involved in making such a decision and really demonstrates the professionalism and commitment of Mr Whitty. Mr Whitty is joinging the Upper Key Stage 2 team as a Learning Partner next year, which will provide the children with much valued familiartity and support. We are delighted that Mr Whitty will continue to be part of our Key Stage 2 team.
